Broadcast interviews, whether via Zoom, phone or in person on campus or at a studio, are unique. To be successful, follow these guidelines.

RADIO INTERVIEWS:



Landline

Use a landline if possible, or whatever is your best line.



Strong Connection

Be sure your connection and headset is strong and static-free.



Headset

No speaker phones. Headsets are best.



Background Noise

No background noise. Keep the kids and the dog away.

BROADCAST PRO TIPS:

Most interviews will be recorded and edited. To offer the best sound bites and make it into the final cut, answer in full sentences that repeat the original question.



- Q. Why is it important to get a flu shot?
- A. Getting a flu shot is important because ...

Exception: Do not repeat a negative question or that will be included in your quote. Use a message point instead.

Q. Isn't it true that the anti-vaxxers could ruin it for us all?



Answer: I don't think the anti-vaxxers could ruin it, but...

YES

Answer: Education is always a critical component of public health...
